Citizenship in the Community Merit Badge (MB) Requirements and Prerequisites

IN CLASS SESSION REQUIREMENTS:

Requirements (1, 2 and 6) can be done in class sessions. **NOTE** - Please print and bring the Citizenship in the Community MB Workbook to the YCP MB College as it needed for class.

- 1. Discuss w/your counselor what citizenship in the community means...
- 2. Do the following:
 - (a) Using an electronic mapping tool or paper map...
 - (b) Chart the organization of your local or state government...
- 6. List some of the services...

PREREQUISITES:

Requirements 3, 4, 5, 7 and 8 <u>can only be done separate/outside of class sessions</u>. Typically these need to be coordinated, approved and conducted at least 30 days/1 month in advance.

3. Do the following:

- (a) <u>Attend</u> an in-person meeting of your city, town or county council, or school board, or local court session; **OR** another state or local governmental meeting **approved in advance by your counselor.**
- (b) Choose one of the issues discussed at the meeting where a difference of opinions was expressed, and explain to your counselor why you agree with one opinion more than you do another one.
- 4. Choose an issue that is important to the citizens of your community; then do the following:
 - (a) Find out which branch of local government is responsible for this issue.
- (b) With your counselor's **and** a parent's/guardian's **approval**, <u>interview</u> one person from the branch you identified in requirement 4 (a). Ask what is being done about this issue and how young people can help.
 - (c) Share what you learned with your counselor.
- 5. With the **approval** of your counselor **and** a parent/guardian, <u>watch a movie</u> that shows how the actions of one individual or group of individuals can have a positive effect on a community. Discuss with your counselor what you learned from the movie about what it means to be a valuable and concerned member of the community.

(A list of 5 suggested movies is attached)

7. Do the following:

- (a) Identify 3 charitable organizations outside of Scouting that interest you and bring people in your community together to work for the good of your community.
- (b) Pick one of the organizations you chose for requirement 7 (a). Using a variety of resources, (e.g., newspapers, fliers and the literature, the internet, volunteers an employees of the organization), find out more about this organization.
- (c) With your counselor's **and** a parent's/guardian's **approval**, contact the organization you chose for requirement 7 (b) and find out what young people can do to help. <u>While working on this MB, volunteer at least 8 hours of your time</u> for this organization. <u>After your volunteer experience is over</u>, discuss what you have learned with your counselor.
- 8. <u>Develop a public presentation</u> (e.g., video, slide show, speech, digital presentation or photo exhibit) about your community. Include information about the history, cultures and ethnic groups of your community; its best features and popular places where people gather; and challenges it faces. <u>Stage your presentation in front of your counselor or a group, such as your patrol or a class at school.</u>

5. With the **approval** of your counselor **and** a parent/guardian, <u>watch a movie</u> that shows how the actions of one individual or group of individuals can have a positive effect on a community.
